Re: Opposition to State Responsibility Area (SRA) Emergency Regulations

Dear Chair Dixon and fellow Board members:

On behalf of the Mendocino County Board of Supervisors, I am writing to express our unanimous and continued opposition to the implementation of State Responsibility Area (SRA) emergency regulations and fire prevention fees as prescribed pursuant to ABX1 29.

The regulations and fee structure as proposed would result in double charges without any additional benefit to rural homeowners, placing a disproportionate share of cost on residents and businesses residing in rural areas throughout California. Rural homeowners are already paying taxes and/or assessments for fire protection services. As such, it is grossly inequitable to require that rural homeowners disproportionately bear the burden of fire protection and prevention activities that benefit all Californians. The fire prevention and protection services of Cal Fire benefit *all* Californian's, not just those who live in SRAs.

The recently revised regulations under consideration don't go far enough in recognizing the fees already paid to local fire protection entities, thereby exposing rural homeowners, property owners, and businesses to even greater financial inequity. Foremost on our minds, is the economic impact these fees will have on our constituents, and the potential challenges that will be faced by first responders in Mendocino County in handling calls for service.

Furthermore, implementation of the emergency regulations and associated fee would adversely impact our already struggling local emergency responders which has the potential of jeopardizing emergency response and the State's highly effective mutual aid system. Mendocino County was actively considering seeking voter approval to raise the funds necessary to sustain our rural fire services. This effort to secure critically needed funding has been abandoned because of the proposed SRA fee. Lack of additional funding will not only impede the ability of rural districts to respond to mutual aid and out of district calls, it will impair continued service within their district boundaries. The options of local jurisdictions working towards solutions will be severely limited. Imposition of the SRA fee will leave rural districts less able and less willing to respond to calls for service outside their district boundaries.

We also wish to renew our invitation to the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection, as communicated on December 23, 2011, to convene a public hearing in Mendocino County as your Board embarks upon the rulemaking process regarding the adoption of permanent regulations implementing State Responsibility Area (SRA) fees.
